I write this in beautiful sunshine in Eastertide, and on the day when we have just laid Steve to rest in Wark churchyard, with the sound of sheep bleating and birds singing. We have all been deeply affected by his faith, courage and sense of Peace since his diagnosis in late November with cancer. Steve lived out his faith in a practical and down to earth way, and when he was first diagnosed, he said to me 'I know that my ministry is not finished here yet.' He prayed around the Deanery every night, and used to tell us where he was starting. He knew the deanery so well and walked in his head from house to house, praying for each of us in turn. Steve loved deeply, had a deep faith and trust in the goodness of God, and he leaves us with that challenge to see God in all things and look for Good in all things.

The fact of the Coronavirus means that we could not meet to give thanks to God for Steve's life, but we will do that when we are able to. For Steve Easter came early; for each of us, we travel, through Eastertide and beyond, holding Melanie and the family in our hearts, and travelling hopefully towards a time when we can meet again and greet each other in an embrace.

During this strange time we will continue to have virtual services at 10.00 am on a Sunday. All the readings are set out on the back of the Broadsheet for those who wish to follow them.

All the names and contact details of the clergy in the area are on the front and we are happy to chat with anyone who wants to ! Steve had chosen Psalm 23, speaking of God and Shepherding, and John 1:1-18, the great prologue to St John's Gospel. This was his favourite passage to preach on. 'In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God and the Word was God. ... the Word became flesh and dwelt with us; we have seen his glory... full of grace and truth". At Christmas we remembered the birth of the frail baby God, and we would not have the glory and joy of Easter without that birth. God is with us even through the shadow of death, the shadow of fear of what might be, and with us as we journey through this together. God bless you all.
