### **Chollerton Vicarage**

We are now past Easter Day but the Season lasts for a while yet and there are some ancient festivals to come in the month of May. Ascension-day falls on May 13<sup>th</sup> and traditionally, the three weekdays before Ascension Day have been kept as Rogationtide. This is a very ancient tradition, developed by Christians from pagan rites to invoke the help of the god of the crops. The name comes from the Latin 'rogare', meaning 'to ask'. These days were kept as days of prayer for God's blessing on the crops, animals and all who worked on the land. Gradually these prayers were developed into processional litanies around the parish, singing prayers to the saints. In England rogation Days were known as 'Gang Days' from the old Norse 'gangr' On these days clergy and people walked through the fields carrying crosses and green branches, and stopping a number of times at the parish boundaries, to say prayers. Place names such as Amen Corner and Gospel Oak recall these stopping places.

In medieval times when there were no printed maps, the annual walk became known as the beating of the bounds. The boundaries of the parish were solemnly beaten with willow rods, and on occasion, boys of the parish were also beaten or bumped upon the ground at the boundaries, to impress the parish limits upon their minds. Food and drink were distributed to the poor and needy of the parish as their dwellings were passed on the walk.

Nowadays Rogationtide is an opportunity to meet up with people from around the parishes, and to pray together for God's will to be done in all the work of the parishes, the Benefice, the deanery, whether in field or on farm, in shop or business, in school or in homes. We can use these days to dedicate ourselves anew to being Christ to those around us. The last year has shown us all how much we need each other and can be Christ to each other in so many ways. Now that we can walk with others to an extent, why not have a walk around your neighbourhood and look, listen and pray for all that you encounter as we journey towards Whitsunday and Pentecost!
