

I wonder what it is that has kept you going through this recent lockdown. Whether you have been staying at home with no social life, or working and unable to ‘wind down’ through social activities, it feels as if this has been a long, hard haul for many people. Unlike last spring, it has not been possible to distract oneself with gardening. So maybe you have developed your cookery skills, or just punctuated the day with regular cups of tea or coffee to break up the time.

I received a lovely gift from my sister, including coffee, chocolate and a coaster for my coffee cup, inscribed with ‘living on grace and coffee’ and I realised that, for me, coffee had become important! (Especially with my treat to myself of a ‘milk frother’ so I can have a sort of cappuccino!) But what about the grace element of the wording? Have I also been dependent on that?

What is grace? Well, it’s a freely given gift, offered to us by someone who is not seeking any return, but simply wants to bless us – like the coaster, coffee and chocolate had been completely unsolicited, and came with no request or demand. And these are indeed the things that have lifted us during this time – a card, a phone call, a small gift, that someone has freely given. All of them are given in love, and all of that love originates from God who is love. As we approach Easter, we remember how Jesus, God in person, showed grace for us, in choosing to die for us in order that we might be reconnected with God. This is a gift, freely given, with no request or demand – all we have to do is to accept it, and we will have the benefit of becoming part of God’s family. I pray that, as you reflect this Easter, you may be able to open your hands and accept God’s amazing grace (with or without coffee!) – then you will be truly living.

Can we start to think that there is maybe light at the end of the tunnel !


I do hope Boris is right. It will be so nice to be able to go somewhere again this summer, or even just having friends for coffee outside or going out for a meal would be marvellous .
